Answer: A

Rationale: A clinical nurse specialist has advanced experience and expertise in a specialized area of practice such as gerontology, pediatrics, critical care, or pulmonary disease. As such, a clinical nurse specialist can help organize appropriate care for a client with complex health needs. Nurse informaticists specialize in the application of information technology in care settings. A nurse researcher contributes to the knowledge base of nursing but may lack the clinical expertise to meet this client's complex needs. A nurse administrator is skilled in organizing and managing departmental operations.

Rationale: Telehealth provides a convenient and effective solution for clients who may be unable or unwilling to attend in-person care, specifically for nursing actions that do not require physical proximity. A clinical nurse specialist can help inform complex care but is less likely to be able to present solutions posed by logistics. Subsidized transportation is not available for most clients, and geographic distance alone is unlikely to qualify a client. Clustering education may appear efficient, but retention is likely to suffer.

Rationale: In addition to using specific nursing theories, another way to organize nursing information in a holistic way is to use a functional approach. Rather than focusing on a client's medical diagnosis, the nurse may focus on how the client responds to that diagnosis. This cannot necessarily be achieved by delegating to a clinical nurse specialist or providing care in the home. Psychosocial interventions are important, but may not be appropriate to prioritize over physiologic interventions in all cases.

Education focuses on the provision of information, not intervention.

A clinical nurse specialist is an advanced-practice role focused on specialty care, not one of the core roles of nurses.

Questions around bachelor's degrees for entry into practice have existed for decades, and it is not predicted that the value of a baccalaureate degree will decrease. American Association of Colleges of Nursing core competencies are already prioritized, and this is expected to continue.

Rationale: Technological advances improve health outcomes. However, many technologies are associated with high costs that supersede any cost savings. Technology is not predicted to make the nursing role obsolete, nor is it predicted to isolate professions from each other. Although health care costs are expected to be a challenge well into the future, the development of a single-payer, universal health care system in the United States is not commonly predicted.

While many nurses enter the workforce with a bachelor's degree, associate degrees are still common, particularly in lower-acuity settings. Master's and doctoral prepared nurses possess higher degrees and expertise and are less likely to provide direct client care in a subacute setting.

Rationale: In baccalaureate programs, the major in nursing is built on a general education base, with concentration on nursing at the upper level. Students acquire knowledge of theory and practice related to nursing and other disciplines, provide nursing care to individuals and groups, work with members of the health care team, use research to improve practice, and have a foundation for graduate study. It includes a focus on nursing leadership skills with additional requirements for clinical practice labs and clinical internships throughout its duration. Licensed practical nursing programs, certification in a nursing specialty, and associate degrees are shorter length programs whose curriculum is focused more on clinical nursing skills.

The nurse researcher is responsible for the continued development and refinement of nursing knowledge and practice through the investigation of nursing problems. The nurse administrator is responsible for managing client care.

Rationale: The administration of a PRN medication requires a health care provider-prescribed intervention (the medication prescription) as well as a nurse-prescribed intervention (determining when the prescription should be carried out and proper administration of the medication); therefore, this action would be considered a collaborative intervention. Nurse-initiated interventions, such as turning and repositioning a client, are described as nurse-prescribed interventions. Health care provider-directed actions are described as health care provider-prescribed interventions. Client advocacy refers to communicating the needs and protecting the needs of the client. Interventions are not normally categorized as independent or dependent.

Rationale: The nurse is responsible for making sure the needs of the client are met based on Maslow's hierarchy of needs. Attending a group activity helps meet the needs of love and belonging (the need to feel that one belongs and is loved to avoid loneliness and isolation). Self-actualization is the highest need and refers to realizing fully all of one's abilities and qualities. Safety and security refers to physical and psychological protection issues and is not suggested as an issue in this scenario. Self-esteem indicates a feeling of self-worth.

This would allow employment that will allow the graduate to provide client care and to assist professional nurses with routine technical procedures as desired. An associate



program will take 2 years and a baccalaureate program will take 4 years; additionally these prepare new nurses to work in a more independent role than this person is seeking. There are very few diploma programs remaining in the United States, and these programs typically take 3 years to complete.

Continuing education allows those with an active license to earn professional continuing credit hours to maintain or advance their licensure or certification.
