Explain what is meant by *mixed methods research* and why a researcher might choose this approach.

Suggested answer: Sample response: *Mixed methods research refers to a design that purposefully blends both quantitative (numeric) and qualitative (narrative) forms of data within a single study. Researchers choose this approach when they believe that using both types of evidence will offer a more complete, nuanced understanding of a research problem than either method alone, for example, using surveys to identify patterns and interviews to understand the reasons behind those patterns.*

Suggested answer: Sample response: Mixed methods research is grounded in the philosophical assumption of pragmatism, which emphasizes using the most appropriate tools to answer a given research question rather than adhering to a single methodological tradition. This approach assumes that both objective (quantitative) and subjective (qualitative) viewpoints contribute valuable insights, and that truth is often complex and multifaceted. As a result, mixed methods researchers purposefully choose designs that allow for integration—such as convergent or explanatory sequential designs—to ensure both forms of data inform one another. For example, in an explanatory sequential design, a researcher may first collect and analyze survey data to identify trends, then follow up with interviews to gain deeper interpretive insight into surprising or unclear results. This design choice reflects the philosophical view that knowledge is best constructed by combining numerical evidence with human perspectives, and influences practical decisions about when and how to integrate findings to create a more nuanced understanding than either method alone would provide.

Evaluate the use of mixed methods in a real-world research context by describing one published study. Explain how the integration of qualitative and quantitative data contributed to the study's conclusions.

Suggested answer: Sample response: One published example of mixed methods research comes from a study examining adolescent mental health service utilization. Researchers began with a large-scale survey to quantify rates of service use and identify demographic patterns across communities. Then, qualitative case studies and interviews with adolescents and parents were conducted to explore factors affecting help-seeking behavior, such as stigma, access barriers, and perceptions of need. The mixed methods design allowed the researchers to connect statistical patterns—such as lower service utilization among rural youth—with qualitative explanations that revealed parental mistrust of providers and lack of confidentiality in small communities. Integration of these two data forms strengthened the overall conclusions by demonstrating not only what patterns existed, but why certain groups were less likely to access services. Without the qualitative component, the survey findings would have lacked explanatory power; without the quantitative component, the case studies might not have revealed broader population trends.

Suggested answer: Sample response: To explain the observed regional differences, an explanatory sequential mixed methods design would be appropriate. In this design, quantitative data are collected and analyzed first—in this case, the national survey revealing variation in concern. The researcher would then purposefully sample individuals from regions showing unexpected results (e.g., low concern in areas with high exposure to climate risks) to participate in follow-up interviews or focus groups. The qualitative phase would aim to uncover underlying attitudes, local cultural norms, or political influences that shaped responses to the survey. Once qualitative data are analyzed, the findings would be integrated with the initial survey results to build a richer explanation of regional variation. This sequencing is justified because it allows the qualitative component to directly address patterns identified in the quantitative phase and produce a deeper, context-based explanation of statistical findings—ultimately enhancing the interpretive power and practical relevance of the study.

Mixed methods also offer complementarity, providing insights into not only whether a program works but how and why it works in context. This depth is critical in decision-making environments, where understanding the mechanisms behind outcomes can guide effective adaptation and scaling. By combining breadth of evidence with depth of understanding, mixed methods approaches produce findings that are both actionable and credible, making them particularly valuable in applied settings.*

Identify and discuss two challenges researchers may face when trying to develop the necessary skills for conducting mixed methods research. How might these challenges impact the quality of a study?

Suggested answer: *Sample response: One major challenge is the need for methodological expertise in both qualitative and quantitative approaches. Researchers trained in only one tradition may find it difficult to design data collection instruments, conduct analyses, or interpret results from the other tradition. If a researcher lacks competency in, for example, qualitative coding, they may overlook important themes or inappropriately integrate findings—thereby weakening the study's conclusions. A second challenge is mastering the advanced techniques involved in integrating data during interpretation. Effective mixed methods research goes beyond simply presenting two sets of findings; it requires skillful merging, convergence, or embedding of data. Without strong analytic integration skills, researchers may treat data sets as parallel rather than complementary, reducing the added value of mixed methods. Both challenges can compromise the overall rigor and credibility of a study, highlighting why skill development is critical in this research tradition.*
