Suggested answer: Sample response: Wilhelm Wundt created the first experimental psychology lab in 1879. Wundt's approach to the study of the mind was structured, systematic, and scientific, using objective measurement and control. Among the methods he developed was intensive introspection, in which trained observers reported on their moment-to-moment reactions to tones, visual displays, and other stimuli. In this way, Wundt and his colleagues studied such topics as attention span, reaction time, color vision, and time perception. In one study, for example, Wundt had an observer look at a block of 12 letters for a fraction of a second and immediately repeat as many as the observer could remember. Six letters seemed to be the upper limit. What would happen if the number of letters in the array were varied? How would others do if given the same task? By recruiting people to serve as participants, varying stimulus conditions, and demanding that all observations be repeated to verify results, Wundt was laying the foundations for today's psychology experiments.

Second, it may be helpful to remember that every situation presents a learning opportunity for yourself or someone else. There will be times when you are the expert and times when you are the learner. It is also important to keep in mind that a confident person isn't necessarily a competent person. Overconfidence bias, a tendency to overestimate our abilities and knowledge, has led to many disastrous outcomes. Doubt can be an excellent motivator to continuously learn, improve, and be more open to new ideas, known as intellectual humility. A third way to combat imposter syndrome is to recognize what you do well and focus on what's going right. Finally, it's helpful to become aware of the not just the successes, but the failures of your role models. Everyone makes mistakes. If we can reframe mistakes as opportunities to move forward and applaud them as such, then we might be less afraid of them.

Application

To the Instructor: Students often have a narrow understanding of the careers available to psychologists. Dr. Kristal Clayton specifically designed this application activity to provide students with an opportunity to creatively address a real-world problem while familiarizing themselves with psychological specializations. The scenario for this activity requires students to consider the increasing population of persons aged 65 and older in the U.S.

For this activity, Dr. Clayton divides students into teams and assigns readings before class so they come prepared to develop a feasible solution. Furthermore, Dr. Clayton encourages students to conduct a web search to learn more about the topic and use their personal experiences and observations to guide their thinking.

To motivate students to arrive prepared for the activity, Dr. Clayton requires each student to submit a sheet of handwritten notes that they developed while completing the preparation reading(s). Students who do not submit a sheet of notes lose points or earn a zero. One example of a preparation reading is the [Harvard University Joint Center for Housing Studies](#) website, which offers a blueprint for intergenerational living. This activity is based on Chapter 1: Psychology's Place in the World, Multidimensional Perspectives, data from Figure 1.1, and Specializations and Careers. Thus, students in Dr. Clayton's class are also required to read Chapter 1 before participating in the activity. This application assignment gives students an opportunity to exercise their application skills and consider social responsibility issues that psychologists can address.

Discussion Activity: AI Psychosis and The Mind/Body Connection

Overview: The following is a discussion topic for you to consider after studying the current chapter. The purpose of this discussion is for you to share your ideas about methods in psychology. The discussion activity is designed for interaction between you and your classmates so you may help each other better understand the chapter. In this activity, it is important for you to engage with your classmates' ideas. Sharing your ideas is encouraged, even if you are not so sure about the accuracy of the content. Indeed, the conversation should help you tune into the subject matter that you may need to go over again. In your discussion, you may also pose questions to your classmates and instructor to better understand their comments. You will be graded according to the rubric provided.

Topic 1

Explain why some people turn to AI chatbots for emotional support and connection. Revisit the information in Chapter 1, 1.4 Psychology and You, the section titled Self-Doubt and Success. Connect overconfidence bias with a typical chatbot conversation. Describe how a chatbot could feed into a person's overconfidence, and in turn, decrease that user's desire to find out for themselves if they are actually wrong. Next, do a web search on your own about AI psychosis, also known as chatbot psychosis. How is it defined, and is it a recognized clinical diagnosis? What risks come with AI psychosis? What people do you believe are the most vulnerable to AI psychosis, and why? Determine whether you believe AI companies, such as OpenAI, have an ethical responsibility to teach the public about AI psychosis and how to avoid it.

Topic 2

Psychology's roots are in philosophy, physiology, and medicine. In addition, research has demonstrated that the mind and body are connected. What does that connection mean in the context of the saying, "You are what you eat?" Conduct a brief web search on the connection between nutrition and mental health. Discuss what your identified sources say about the importance of food to the gut microbiome, immune system, learning, and mental health. Based on what you learned, are you really what you eat? If so, what might you change about your current diet to improve your

wellness? Develop a list of five suggestions that you could share with your friends to help them improve their wellness through changing what they eat.

The students are required to find at least one relevant article using the library system that informs their argument. You immediately think about what you learned regarding self-doubt and success from Chapter 1: Psychology's Place in the World.
 - a. In your own terms, describe imposter syndrome and how it can help decrease overconfidence bias while increasing intellectual humility.
 - b. Explain how imposter syndrome can be harnessed to help a new employee, such as yourself, be successful.

Concept Highlights for Chapter 1: Psychology's Place in the World

Psychology is the scientific study of behavior and mental processes. Psychologists use the scientific method to collect empirical (i.e., observational) data via systematic observation. Because we hold many biases, it is difficult to step away from the way our brains work so that we may study others and ourselves. Therefore, the use of the scientific method is a more objective way to study people than is the use of common sense, intuition, folk wisdom, and personal experience.

A Brief History of Psychology

How did psychology become the science that it is today? Before modern psychology was established, philosophers and physiologists were asking similar questions about human behavior that psychologists currently investigate. These questions included the role of experience in learning and how the body works. For example, René Descartes (1596–1650) proposed the idea of the reflex (an involuntary reaction to environmental stimuli) and of dualism (the idea that the mind and the body are separate entities). Reflexes have been supported in current psychology, but dualism is not accepted by mainstream psychology. The current consensus is that brain activity *is* the mind.

Thomas Hobbes disagreed with Descartes (1588–1679), and proposed that the human experience—including thoughts, feelings, and behaviors—consists of physical processes originating from the brain. Thus, Hobbes believed the human experience could be studied, and studied it was. The first official psychology experiment was conducted in 1879 by Wilhelm Wundt (1832–1920) in Leipzig, Germany, and measured the reaction time between participants' hearing a sound and reacting to it. Wundt's focus was to discover the structural elements of the mind by asking people to introspect on their feelings and experiences.

On the other hand, William James (1842–1919) was mainly concerned about the purpose, or function, of our behaviors, mental processes, and experience. This perspective was inspired by Darwin's theory of evolution by natural selection.

Later, behaviorism took a completely different approach to data collection, focusing on recording observable behaviors rather than introspective accounts. Behaviorism was coined by John B. Watson (1878–1958) who contributed to the literature on fear conditioning. Another famous behaviorist was B. F. Skinner (1904–1990), who was a pioneer of operant conditioning.

While behaviorism was popular in North America, Sigmund Freud's (1856–1939) psychoanalysis was very influential in Europe. During psychoanalysis, the psychoanalyst works with clients one-on-one to tap into their unconscious minds, of which they are unaware. The purpose of this therapy is for clients to gain insight into the origins of their psychological problems so they may resolve them.

Humanistic psychology took a different approach to therapy. From this perspective, people do have self-awareness and can make choices about their personal growth. Key figures in this movement were Carl Rogers (1902–1987), who developed person-centered therapy, and Abraham Maslow (1908–1970), who proposed the pyramid of needs.

In the 1950's, the cognitive revolution focused on the study of cognitive processes such as memory, learning, understanding, and communicating. Neuroscience tools have led to cognitive neuroscience, which has identified brain-specificity for certain cognitive tasks. Neuroscience has also uncovered information about brain chemistry.

The Many Ways to be a Psychologist

There are many approaches psychologists may take to understand behavior and mental processes. They may employ and combine many perspectives, including evolutionary, developmental, neuroscience, behavioral, social-cultural, cognitive, and psychodynamic perspectives. Different perspectives inform the psychologist with different hypotheses and theories.

With so many perspectives, there are many ways to be a psychologist, and some psychologists do not conduct research. However, even those who do not conduct studies themselves use research to solve problems and increase people's quality of life. For example, clinical psychologists help clients with psychological disorders. Counseling psychologists often work with people dealing with life problems, such as administering marriage and family therapy, or helping students cope with their overwhelming schedules and responsibilities. Other ways to be a psychologist include industrial/organizational psychologist, school psychologist, forensic psychologist, geropsychologist, health psychologist, human factors psychologist, developmental psychologist, cognitive psychologist, neuropsychologist, neuroscientist, educational psychologist, social psychologist, and many more.

Applications and Solutions

Using psychology to solve problems and improve people's quality of life brings with it ethical considerations. Imagine that a psychologist is asked to testify in court as an expert on memory and forgetting. What might be the consequences of their testimony? Could it lead to a guilty verdict? Should psychologists involve themselves in politics and legislation, such as students' cell phone access while attending public schools, and the ramifications of online bullying?

Psychologists have a long history of activism, which reflects the mission of the American Psychological Association: to use psychological science to benefit humanity. A current issue worth noting is healthcare disparities. Millions of Americans struggle to get the medical and mental health care they need due to cost and availability. In addition, today's schoolchildren need counselors and social-emotional support. Hence, cities, counties, and states are passing legislation and redirecting funds to support student wellness.

You can also use psychology to help yourself and understand the things you care about better. Take the old saying that "money can't buy happiness." Is that true? Dunn and colleagues (2011) would disagree. Their findings demonstrate that when we spend our money in a prosocial manner, we experience happiness, and that happiness can have a more significant impact on our well-being than when we spend it on ourselves.

While psychological research teaches us many valuable lessons, the research process is complex. Many mistakes have been made along the way. It is important to acknowledge mistakes, as they are unavoidable lessons in themselves. Much of what we know about psychology came from researchers who never gave up, even when their work was tedious, ignored, expensive, or failed to produce the results they were hoping for.

To the Instructor: These discussion topics are designed to engage students in conversation about the content of the current chapter. The discussions may take place in a classroom or on the online platform of the course. The scenario is designed to offer structure to the

discussion, so that students may focus on their understanding of the links between the major topics in the chapter. Students are encouraged to engage and share anything they think may be important, even if it may need to be corrected for accuracy. In the classroom, you may wish to divide students into breakout groups and let them discuss the topic before bringing them all together into a discussion as a larger group. On the online platform, students should comment on the main thread and reply to at least two other posts. Research Paper Instructions

To the Instructor: The provided activities have been designed to allow for students to explore some research topics they will likely find interesting. Students will conduct comprehensive literature searches and write a research paper on the current state of the question. The purpose of this writing assessment is for students to show that they are able to find proper peer-reviewed papers and disseminate the findings in a coherent manner in APA format. The process has been divided into three parts to help students break down the tasks, stay motivated and not feel overwhelmed. In grading this assignment, it is suggested that you conduct two checkpoints for students. At Checkpoint #1, students should show you at least seven relevant peer-reviewed journal articles. At Checkpoint #2, they should show you an outline of the assignment, which will include any subheadings they plan to use and a summary of the content of each section. These checkpoints will provide an opportunity for students to flesh out their ideas and receive feedback with suggestions for improvement. They will also minimize last-minute assignments. A simple, adjustable rubric has been provided below, and the checkpoints are worth 40% in the process.

Research Paper Instructions

To the Student: For this activity, you are asked to choose a topic and write a research paper. The steps to write this paper have been divided into three parts. After the first two parts, the instructor will conduct a checkpoint and provide you with feedback so you may move onto the next part. The grading rubric for this assignment has been provided below.

PART 1

First, you will conduct a comprehensive literature search to find the best, most relevant and/or current information on the topic. You may need to meet with a librarian to get help with this step. All your sources need to be peer-reviewed journal articles from the library system. You will need at least seven peer-reviewed journal articles. Next, you should read the papers, highlight the important parts, and write a short summary of each. Then, put the

articles into an APA-style References section. At this point, there will be a checkpoint and this step is worth 3 points.

PART 2

Second, you will critically think about what these papers suggest regarding the research topic as a whole. Once you understand the state of the question, based on your resources, you will create an outline of the paper. In this outline, you will plan for the points you intend to make in your paper. You may consider breaking down the points into different sections and use different subheadings for the different points. For each point to be made, show which articles you will include in the section as support in the form of in-text citations. You should also plan for an introduction paragraph and a conclusion paragraph.

PART 3

Write the full research paper according to your plan. You should aim for five to eight pages or 1,250–2,000 words, double-spaced in APA format. Every point that you are making should have support in the form of in-text citations of the references you have found. You may visit www.APAstyle.org to look at the proper APA format for research papers. Proofreading your work at the writing center is a good idea.
