Briefly discuss what is meant by the phrase "correlation does not equal causation."

Suggested answer: Sample response: Research indicates that having better social support might lead to better physical health outcomes. On the other hand, the other direction of causality might also be true: People with worse health might be less likely to go out with friends, less likely to initiate romantic relationships, or even be less likely to join social groups, so it could be that worse health leads to lower social support. This is a good example of the reason why "correlation does not equal causation." We know that physical health and social support are tied together, but we cannot say for sure whether one causes change in the other without a different kind of research. At first glance, both directions of causality are equally plausible.

Discuss the findings from the Alameda County social support and physical health study. Discuss the overall implications of the findings.

Suggested answer: Sample response: In the Alameda County sample, death rates for people between 20 and 29 years old were very low, regardless of social support levels, but for older participants, higher levels of social support were associated with lower death rates over the 9 years of the study. This trend was especially pronounced for men and was stronger as people got older. Overall, people with better social support were 2–4 times less likely to die. You can imagine how the four kinds of social support—emotional, tangible, informational, and companionship—might contribute to healthier habits, more frequent exercise, more visits to the doctor, and so on. People might have a friend with whom they go to the gym a few times a week, or someone's partner might remind them to take their pills or make doctor's appointments. In these ways, having better social support might lead to better physical health outcomes. This indicates that relationship development and encouragement of socialization is an important element in human development.

Discuss Zick Rubin's operationalized definition of love. What were the problems with his definition?

Suggested answer: Sample response: His definition was this: "love between unmarried opposite-sex peers, of the sort which could possibly lead to marriage." Right away, you can probably see several problems with this definition. First, it assumes that most people in love are on a path toward marriage, but many couples may not be interested in marriage at all. Next, it assumes that romantic love only exists between "opposite-sex" peers, which means that only heterosexual, cisgender people feel love. Lastly, it assumes that married people do not feel romantic love.

Although Rubin's Liking and Loving Scales are somewhat dated and seem limited in describing love across different types of intimate relationships, they have been used within contemporary research. Identify at least one study in the last 20 years that has used Rubin's Liking and Loving Scales and describe the findings of that study.

Suggested answer: Sample response: A study found that higher scores on Rubin's Love Scale were associated with more certainty and confidence about the status of people's relationships, as well as more confidence in their own feelings about their partner, and more confidence in their partner's feelings (Knobloch et al., 2001). In another study, people reported being more in love when their current partners matched their ideal expectations in terms of trustworthiness, attractiveness, and status (Campbell et al., 2001). When married couples filled out the Rubin Love Scale in another study, higher scores were correlated with better overall marital quality, more sexual satisfaction, and better communication (Perrone & Worthington, 2001).

Q30. [Essay] · Cognitive Domain: Analysis

Describe how the eight types of love defined within Sternberg's theory can change over time.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Commitment, intimacy, and passion can fluctuate up and down within a given relationship over time. At the beginning of a new potential relationship, the two people involved barely know each other (nonlove); all three components are low. As time goes on, they quickly develop physical attraction toward each other; as their passion peaks and is the driving force behind spending time together, they are infatuated. This matches a finding (Walster et al., 1966) that on first dates, physical attraction is the most important factor in how much people feel satisfied by the end. A bit later, if the couple members become emotionally invested and decide to commit to each other, for a moment in time, they achieve consummate love.
