Define and describe the importance of taking a scientific perspective when approaching the study of human memory.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Science refers to a particular view of the world, one based on systematic observation, experimentation, and theory. Critical to science is an unbiased attitude. A scientist needs to be open to different points of view but follow his or her data to the most logical conclusions, and these are based on evidence, not on the researcher's opinion. In science, a particular theory is useful only if careful and unbiased observations and experimentation support it. For psychological science, data derived from experiments constitute the building blocks of our theories. Our intuitions and guesses about the world have value, but to be science, they must be tested and verified via the scientific method. This is important when studying human memory, as this allows us to produce empirical evidence related to our studies.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Empirical evidence refers to data that is independently verifiable. These data are essential to developing scientific theory. Other researchers need to be able to replicate the research, and it needs to be observable.

Explain the difference between classical and operant conditioning.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Both classical and operant conditioning refer to learning. With classical conditioning, however, learning occurs when a previously neutral stimulus triggers a specific behavior after repeatedly be paired with another stimulus that produces the same behavior. In contrast, with operant conditioning involves learning through consequences. Reinforcement after a behavior makes it more likely that behavior will be repeated. Conversely, punishment after a behavior makes it less likely that behavior will be repeated.

Explain Ebbinghaus's retention interval theory and describe its importance.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Ebbinghaus believed that the time between when something was learned (or encoded) and when it is remembered was called a retention interval, and that the longer the retention interval, the more likely you were to forget things. For example, he tried to remember items on a list. After a retention interval of just a few minutes, he might remember all of the syllables from a list, but if he waited a week, he might have forgotten a substantial number of syllables. This theory is important because it developed another truism in memory—the longer the amount of time between learning and remembering, the more will be forgotten.

Describe three ways in which a person can improve memory efficiency, and identify instances in which each strategy would be useful.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Some ways in which a person can improve memory efficiency include utilizing visual imagery mnemonics, spaced rehearsal, and linkword mnemonics. Visual imagery mnemonics are useful for mastering new-language vocabulary but of little use in learning to play a new musical instrument. Linkword mnemonics are useful in learning name–face associations, but they will not help you remember the name of your kindergarten teacher when somebody asks you many years later. Spaced rehearsal is helpful for remembering facts about the world, learning a skilled task such as typing or playing a musical instrument, and remembering landmark events from one's life.
