Chapter 1: The Evolution of Psychology

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PURPOSE AND PERSPECTIVE OF THE CHAPTER

The purpose of this first chapter is to provide a brief overview of the history of psychological science. We discuss Psychology's early history and major figures, as well as the field's modern history. We also review more contemporary perspectives related to psychological science and the major themes that unite the discipline. The chapter includes both personal and critical-thinking applications.

THEMES HIGHLIGHTED IN THE CHAPTER

Theme 1: Psychology is empirical. Through the readings, class participation, and activities, students will learn about the necessity for acquiring knowledge through systematic observation rather than intuition, common sense, or speculation.

Theme 2: Psychology is theoretically diverse. In many instances, psychology does not provide black-and-white answers. Warn your students that approaching psychology in that manner may blind them to potential solutions. Understanding the concept of theoretical diversity paves the way for comprehension of other difficult concepts.

Theme 3: Psychology evolves in a sociohistorical context. Psychology has changed, is changing, and will inevitably keep changing. Contextualizing psychology as an evolving science that is responsive to history and societal changes is important for students to track the field's development. It is also important for them to understand that psychology is not in its "final form"—it is *still* changing!

Theme 4: Psychology is practical. Psychology can be applied to change our lives. In this chapter, students will see how psychology has grown into a field that can help improve our lives in myriad ways.

Theme 5: Behavior is determined by multiple causes. Students often enter introductory psychology wondering about the "cause" of behavior. Exploring the multiple causes of behavior can help students begin to see that multiple variables often facilitate even some of the most mundane behaviors. This is a great idea for students to continue to think over as they prepare for Chapter 2.

Theme 6: Our behavior is shaped by cultural heritage. This theme recognizes that the typical coverage of psychology is quite ethnocentric. As a discipline, psychology is attempting to correct its "sins of omission" and address a wide range of diversity topics. The inclusion of this theme will help you address some of those diversity topics throughout the course.

Theme 7: Heredity and environment jointly influence behavior. Theme 7 is simply a specific extension of Theme 5. If you have convinced your students to accept the notion of multiple causation, it should not be too difficult to convince them that their heredity and their environment are two sources of influence.

Theme 8: People's experience of the world is highly subjective. This vital theme stresses that everyone experiences the world and events differently. Only when one can entertain the reality of multiple perspectives and experiences can one appreciate the research approaches highlighted in Chapter 2 and referred to throughout the introductory course.

Psychoanalytic theory: attempts to explain personality, motivation, and mental disorders by focusing on unconscious determinants of behavior.

Structuralism: based on the notion that the task of psychology is to analyze consciousness into its basic elements and investigate how these elements are related.

3. **Lessons from the father** (01.01) 5–10 minutes.
 - a. Wilhelm Wundt is often called the father of scientific psychology. What did he provide to the field? How are his influences visible today? Do you think that the label of “father” is warranted?
4. **Learning from history** (01.05) 10 minutes.
 - a. Why is it important to be knowledgeable about the history of psychology? What can we learn about current issues in psychology by looking at the past? How can historical views of psychology be useful in understanding today’s problems? Is it useful to learn about theories that are no longer in use or that have been deemed highly controversial? Take a current event from the media and use historical perspectives to give explanations for the event and responses to it.

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ADDITIONAL ACTIVITIES AND ASSIGNMENTS

The following are activities and assignments developed by Cengage but not included in the text, PPTs, or courseware (if courseware exists). They are for you to use if you wish.

1. **Student Conceptions of Psychology:** Although most students have some basic knowledge about biology, grammar, or music when they enroll in such a course, students who enroll in introductory psychology usually lack an understanding of the topic. Thus, a potential exercise for the initial class meeting is to pass out index cards and ask students to write their name and their definition of psychology. You can also ask them to note three topics that they expect to cover during the course.

You can use this information in various ways:

- a) Contrast students' definitions of psychology with the definition in the text. Student definitions (and anticipated topics) often center on the professional aspect of psychology, but not the scientific. This is a good time to begin to indoctrinate them with **Theme 1** of the text (Psychology is empirical).
- b) Point out to students that although their definitions may not match that specified in the book, psychology is an ever-evolving discipline whose definition has changed considerably over the years.
 - Consider the definitions given by some of psychology's pioneers:
 - *Psychology is the Science of Mental Life, both of its phenomena and their conditions.* (James, 1890, p. 1)
 - *Psychology is the science of mind . . . the science of that which thinks, feels, and wills, in contrast with physics as the science of that which moves in space and occupies space.* (Hoffding, 1893, p. 1)
 - *Psychology, the science of mental facts or mind, . . . deals with the thoughts and feelings of human beings and seeks to explain the facts of intellect, character and personal life.* (Thorndike, 1907, p. 1)

- *Psychology is more exactly defined as science of the self in relation to, or conscious of, its environment.* (Calkins, 1919, p. 1)
 - *Psychology is that division of natural science which takes human activity and conduct as its subject matter. It attempts to formulate through systematic observation and experimentation the laws and principles which underlie man's reactions.* (Watson, 1919, p. 1)
 - Point out to your students that these early psychologists “missed the boat,” just as the students probably did. They, too, left out one side of psychology, the applied side. This observation will set the stage for an important point made in Chapter 1: Applied psychology was slow to develop compared to psychology as a science.
 - c) Save the cards until later in the course. At that time, pass out new cards and ask students to complete the exercise again, this time defining psychology and listing the three most memorable topics covered during the term. Then give them their original cards from the first day of class. Discuss the changes in their definitions. Are the topics that they remember vividly the same as those they expected to cover in the course?
2. **Getting to Know Your Class:** Introductory psychology courses can vary widely in terms of students' majors. It may be helpful for you to know early on in the course what the range of student majors looks like in your course. It can also help build a sense of community in your course, which can benefit the quality of your course discussions and engagement across the term (Chlup & Collins, 2010). This can be as simple as asking for a show of hands as to who is a psychology major. Alternatively, you could have students fill out a notecard or online form with their major.
- a) You can use this brief activity as an icebreaker between students. Have students introduce themselves to several students. Depending on the layout and size of your class, you can ask them to introduce themselves to one student per row, assign them to small groups, etc.
 - b) Some follow-up questions can include:
 - i. What are some ways that your major works alongside psychology? If they are talking to a psychology major, what are some settings in which psychology is helpful? In what ways does it help?
 - 1. (Tip): If many of the settings/applications students discuss are medical/clinical, this question offers a great opportunity to talk about the many other types of psychology and how psychologists in those fields work to improve our lives.
 - ii. What topic on the course schedule are you most excited to learn about this term? Why is this topic exciting for you?

3. **Misconceptions about Psychology:** Students often bring several misconceptions about psychology to your course. You may want to tap these false beliefs for your own information or for a lively discussion in class. You can determine what some of the misconceptions are in at least two different ways:
- Pass out a blank index card to each student at the beginning of the first class session. Tell the students to write down five things they already know about psychology.
 - Be sure to tell them NOT to put their name on the card. Anonymity will encourage students to be more candid, giving you a larger number and wider range of misconceptions.
 - You can discuss the misconceptions as soon as the cards have been turned in, but it may be better to wait until the next class period so you have time to sort through the cards and ascertain any major trends.
 - Online tools such as Google Forms and Qualtrics are potential alternatives to the paper-and-pencil method. You can create simple surveys and embed their corresponding links or QR codes into your lecture slides, allowing students to submit their responses on their mobile devices.
 - A discussion of your students' misconceptions will allow you to set a more realistic foundation for your course.
 - Give your students a paper-and-pencil test concerning common misconceptions in psychology. Griggs and Ransdell (1987) identified a set of 15 misconceptions that have received at least 50 percent true responses in at least two of the four studies cited (Gardner & Dalsing, 1986; Griggs & Ransdell, 1987; Lamal, 1979; Vaughan, 1977). Their list of 15 misconceptions appears in HM 1-1. You can use all of them or merely a sample. The items are rank-ordered from those most often rated as true to those least often rated as true. Remember, however, that even the lowest-ranked items still received at least 50 percent true responses in at least two studies.
 - Should your students become distressed over endorsing a high percentage of these items as true, you can point out that Griggs and Ransdell (1987) found that students who had taken a high school psychology course performed no better on this test than students who had not taken such a course. In addition, Gardner and Hund (1983) found that faculty members (primarily those teaching subjects other than social science and those with MA degrees) found this test to be a difficult task. Psychology is a difficult subject that deals with controversial topics. Challenge your students to question what they read and not to blindly accept "facts" at face value.

4. **“Psychology” in the Media:** Television shows featuring “psychologists” (not everyone providing advice is actually a psychologist) are a staple of “reality” television.
 - a) Watch an episode of such a show and write a review, being certain to include an evaluation of the likely “success” of the advice offered.
 - b) What does the general public learn about psychology from these shows?
 - c) What misperceptions exist?
 - d) Why do you think that academic psychologists have such negative views of TV/radio “psychologists”?
5. **Write It Out:** Have students engage in a free write to illustrate what William James described as “stream of consciousness.”
 - a) Allow students 5–10 minutes to write down everything that comes to mind as it occurs to them, including physical sensations. Encourage students to follow their thoughts wherever they wander, however bizarre or seemingly unrelated to each other.
 - b) Afterward, ask students to respond to the following question: *What did you learn about the way your mind works?* Elicit responses from a variety of students.

8. **The Clinical Bias in Psychology:** Korn and Lewandowski (1981) introduced the term “clinical bias” to explain why graduate clinical psychology programs have so many more applicants than spaces available. They suggested “this bias exists because of the popular image of psychologist as clinician, an image which has not been corrected by undergraduate education” (p. 149). In introducing students to the discipline of psychology, you may want to attempt to dispel this one-sided view of the field. Smith (1982) suggested a clever exercise to illuminate the extent of the problem for your students.
- a) First, ask your students to list five traits that are typical of a scientist.
 - b) Then ask the students to list five traits typical of a psychologist.
 - c) Have students share their descriptions with the class or, if shyness overwhelms them, collect the papers and read the descriptions anonymously.
 - d) The difference between the two groups of adjectives is usually overwhelming; students do not see psychologist and scientist as overlapping terms.
 - e) At this point, you can use your text’s table of contents to demonstrate the diversity of scientific topics to be covered throughout the term. Only a few chapters deal with the topics that students expect to see.
 - f) During the term, you can continue to stress the theme that Psychology is empirical to reinforce the point of this demonstration.
9. **HOAX!** Go to Snopes or a similar site and identify several current hoaxes being spread via email, Facebook, or other social media.
- a) Provide students with copies of the hoaxes but not the analyses of the hoaxes.
 - b) Ask the students to explain the prevalence of such hoaxes using sociocultural theory and Freudian theory.
10. **What Interests You?** Ask students to come up with psychological questions that most interest them and categorize these questions by the subfield that would address each question.
- a) If students do not bring up a sufficient range of questions, prompt them with questions such as:
 - How can employers increase job satisfaction?
 - How can we learn more about dementia?
 - What happens in our brains when we learn?
 - What is the impact of AI on learning?
 - b) Ask students to discuss which psychology career choice (or choices) would enable them to address these questions.

11. **Clinical Disciplines:** Many people think only of clinical psychology when they think of psychology. Psychology certainly does offer opportunities to work in clinical settings for people with a range of levels of education and professional certifications.
- Identify and describe two other disciplines that offer opportunities for work in clinical settings.
 - What degrees and certifications are required for clinical work in those disciplines?
12. **Improving Academic Performance:** Many introductory psychology students are still familiarizing themselves with college life. Many do not know how to study.
- Ask students whether they systematically apply all (or most) of the study techniques suggested in Chapter 1, Personal Application. Ask them to speculate on the reasons why some students don't apply effective learning strategies.
 - Discuss possible solutions for each reason they give. Often, students do not even realize that they have poor study habits. After you have students complete the questionnaire, there are several ways in which you could use the data, such as discussing approaches to studying in class.
 - You could use this opportunity to point out the general costs and benefits involved in exercising control over one's life or to emphasize students' responsibilities for their education. Give blank schedules like the one in the text (see Figure 1.8) to students. Encourage them to develop their own study schedule and stick to it.
13. **The Stimulus Error:** Wight (1989) developed a teaching activity designed to help students understand the introspective process and some of its pitfalls. Structuralist psychology, as conceived by E. B. Titchener, used the method of introspection to study the functioning of the mind. It is easy to define introspection as the method of self-report, but it is much more difficult to carry out the procedure. Titchener set down some rigid rules for the proper use of introspection:
- The introspectionist must be able to determine when the test stimulus has been introduced and when the process of introspection is to be started.
 - The introspectionist must be in a state of "strained attention."
 - The introspectionist must be able to repeat the observation several times.
 - The stimuli must be manipulable.

Additionally, Titchener would not allow his subjects to use common, everyday words. The subject was to describe hues, brightness, and spatial characteristics when introspecting about a new automobile, for example. Words describing the object itself, like "Ford" or "Chevrolet," were not acceptable. According to Titchener, anyone who used these everyday words committed the "stimulus error."

Wight's classroom activity is to let students practice the art of introspection, trying to adhere to all of Titchener's rules as closely as possible. Give each student a Hershey's Chocolate Kiss®. Tell the students to unwrap their candy and place it on their tongue (no biting or chewing allowed). Then ask them to describe the "elemental sensations" that they experience. Someone will typically note that the candy is sweet (which is correct). Responses of "chocolate" or "good" are not acceptable, because they are either a description or a value judgment—examples of committing the stimulus error. Other possible responses that are acceptable include "creamy," "grainy" (if the Kisses are old), and "bitter."

14. **Psychologists' Family Trees:** After learning of the academic genealogy of one or more psychology faculty members, students may have a better understanding of psychology's roots. Through the use of the internet and email, students can construct a genealogy for your department's faculty. This project should not involve a great deal of effort or time. Here is a simple plan for a class activity/project:
- Instruct small groups that they are to trace the lineage of a selected faculty member as far back as they can.
 - Students can start searching online (many faculty members have their dissertations and curriculum vitae available online), and can follow up with faculty via email or face-to-face interviews.
 - One or more of the "family trees" constructed by your students should have at its roots one of the founding fathers of psychology.
 - The results of this project could be duplicated and distributed to the entire class or prepared in a large poster format and displayed in the classroom. You may opt to focus only on your own genealogy in class.
 - Ask students to describe the different historical influences that they can identify in the genealogy.
 - Is only one school of thought represented in the genealogy, or do different historical influences appear?
