53. Compare and contrast structuralism and functionalism as historical approaches to psychology.

ANS:

Structuralism is the approach taken by Wilhelm Wundt, who thought that complex aspects of psychology could be understood by investigating fundamental or simple units of the mind, such as how human senses and perception worked.

Functionalism was the idea that the best way to understand complex aspects of psychology was to focus on theories about what functions, behaviors, and thoughts served. Functionalism was founded by William James, who was highly influenced by Darwin's theory of natural selection.

When thinking about the mind and behavior, structuralism looks for building blocks, and functionalism looks at motives and usefulness.

54. Describe how behaviorists approached psychology and how this approach led to the cognitive revolution.

ANS:

Behaviorism focuses on how humans and other animals change behavior through experiencing specific stimuli and receiving rewards and punishments for their actions. Behaviorists often use animal models in highly controlled experiments. Some thought that behaviorists focused too heavily on behavior and reinforcement. This led to the cognitive revolution, which focused more on the working mind.

55. Explain the humanistic approach to psychology and why it was a departure from behaviorism and psychoanalysis.

ANS:

A humanistic approach is an approach to psychology and therapy that emphasizes a person's greatest potential and the idea that humans have control and agency over their behaviors and emotions. In other words, we have free will to be the best version of ourselves. This was a departure from psychoanalysis, which tended to focus on a person's darker side related to repressed sexual desires and aggressive tendencies. It was also a departure from behaviorism, which focused on how behaviors are mindlessly shaped through reinforcement, which discounted free will.

56. Explain the difference between a holistic and reductionistic approach to psychology.

ANS:

A holistic approach looks at larger and more complex observations that are difficult to understand by looking at the components. These might be issues related to social psychology, consciousness, perception, or child development.

The reductionistic approach is more interested in the fundamental components of behavior. This might be the activity of a single neuron, principles of associative learning, or theories of psychophysics. Biopsychologists are often more reductionistic than holistic in their approaches and interests.

57. You are asked to design an experiment to investigate whether short-term memory is improved by drinking beverages containing caffeine. You have three types of beverages: one with no caffeine, one with 50 mg of caffeine, and one with 100 mg of caffeine. Ten minutes after drinking the beverage, participants are asked to memorize 30 words and recall as many as possible two minutes later. Describe the procedures for this experiment using a within-subjects design and describe the procedure using a between-subjects design.

ANS:

Within-subjects design: Each participant would come back on three separate days. Each day, they would drink a different beverage and try to remember and recall different words. Each participant would drink all three types of beverages and attempt to remember and recall a list of words after each type of beverage.

Between-subjects design: There would be three groups of participants. Members of each group would be assigned to drink one, but not all, of the three types of beverages. Each participant in this experiment would only drink one beverage and try to remember and recall the words once.

58. Describe the five steps of the scientific method.

ANS:

- Empiricism: make observations of the natural world.
- Hypothesis: from observations, create a testable hypothesis.
- Experimentation: design a well-controlled experiment with levels of manipulations or independent variables and accurate measurements or dependent variables. Control for the problem of subjectivity. Quantify and analyze the results.
- Theory: use results to create or modify theories.
- Replication: modify and repeat the experiment. Conduct a meta-analysis of similar experiments.

ANS:

The independent variable is the different ages (15 and 25) while the dependent variable is the scores on the 10-question survey about depression symptoms. The longitudinal design would have the same participants fill out the survey when they were 15 years old and again at the age of 25. The cross-sectional design would have a different group of participants fill out the survey. One group would be 15 years old, and the other group would be 25 years old.

60. There are several subdisciplines in psychology that focus on basic research. Pick five subdisciplines and provide an example of what a researcher in this field would study.

ANS:

- **Biopsychology:** A researcher in this area would be interested in studying the neuroscience of behavior and mental processes. They might use animal models to investigate the activity of certain brain structures or neuroimaging devices to look at the working brain of a person.
- **Learning:** A researcher in this area would be interested in how experiments change behavior. They often use animal models to look at how reinforcement shape behaviors in highly controlled laboratory experiments.
- **Cognitive Psychology:** Researchers in this area use humans and other animals to investigate memory, decision making, language, intelligence, and the nature of consciousness.

- **Developmental Psychology:** Researchers in this area would be particularly interested in age-related changes to aspects of psychology from early infancy to late adulthood.
- **Human Sexuality:** Experiments conducted in this subfield relate to sexual behavior, sexual orientation, and gender.
- **Personality psychology:** A researcher in this area would be interested in individual differences in emotional expression and regulation, values, attitudes, social preferences, and self-perception. Personality psychologists often use well-established personality tests when conducting research.
- **Social psychology:** Researchers in this subfield would be interested in how a person's behavior, emotions, thoughts, and decision-making influence and are influenced by other people.
- **Cultural psychology:** A researcher in this area would be interested in studying how a person's culture, race, religion, and ethnic identity influence aspects of their emotions and mental processes. For example, a researcher might investigate how a person's culture might influence how they seek mental health services.
- **Psychopathology:** Researchers in this area would be often interested in psychological problems such as depression, anxiety, or schizophrenia. Psychopathologists might be interested in assessments, underlying causes, or treatment.

61. Describe some of the challenges facing research in psychology, such as the WEIRD problem, publication biases, and the replication crisis.

ANS:

The WEIRD problem is that past and even present research have used participant pools that lack diversity. Participant pools tend to come from Western, educated, industrialized, rich, and democratic societies, yet the results of many experiments are thought to generalize the general population of all countries.

Publication biases are problems with how the papers are chosen for publication. There tends to be a bias to publish positive results—results that support the hypotheses of the experiment. There are also strong and often

coercive incentives for scientists to get more publications, leading to intentional or unintentional selection or manipulation of data.

The replication crisis is that the findings of many published research papers are not found again when the study is replicated. This leads to an erosion of confidence in the findings of research in psychology. This replication crisis is likely due, in part, to problems of publication biases and pressures to publish.

62. Provide examples of careers in applied approach to psychology. Describe the education needed for specific positions and what they do in their jobs.

ANS:

- Clinical Psychology: Clinical psychologists typically earn a Ph.D., log many hours of supervised field experience, and pass state exams to be licensed. They work directly with treating clients with psychological disorders or help clients deal with trauma or grief. A clinical psychologist may also work in academia and be involved in research.
- Psychiatry: This requires a medical degree (MD). People studying psychiatry typically do rotations in other specialties in medicine before becoming a psychiatrist. They work directly with clients and patients with psychological disorders. Unlike other applied psychology careers, psychiatrists can prescribe medication.
- Counselor: This is a therapist who works directly with clients on mental health issues. Counselors require a master's degree, many hours of supervised work with clients, and passing licensing exams.
- Applied behavior analysis (ABA): This requires a master's degree, supervised hours, and licensing. People in this field use behavior modification techniques and tend to work with children on the autism spectrum.
- School psychologists: This requires an EdS degree that typically takes at least three years. School psychologist work with K-12 education, evaluating and creating ways to help students with learning and behavioral problems.
