Identity refers to the way people perceive themselves or some aspect of self, or how people represent themselves to others. A person can have multiple identities, such as cultural identity, religious identity, national identity, and also gender identity.

100. Explain the universal of women doing laundry more often than men.

The universal of women doing laundry more often than men comes from common historical roots where, with the development of agriculture and the increase in wealth and quantity of clothing, many societies started to develop sex-segregated roles, assigning domestic tasks more to females than males, particularly within the household, and there is no evidence that women innately prefer domestic tasks. This has continued decades after major transitions of gender roles and attitudes, so that from countries as diverse as Japan, Saudi Arabia, and the United States, it's still the case that wives are more likely to cook and clean than husbands are.

101. Discuss the reasons why both types of societies—postagricultural and indigenous—developed a patriarchal family structure after adopting agriculture.

Despite immense linguistic and cultural differences between indigenous societies and the postagricultural cultures of ancient India, China, North Africa, the Middle East, and Europe, all these societies developed patriarchal structures after adopting agriculture. Reasons for this include the division of labor, with the 15 to 20 percent greater upper body strength favoring males for production of food in a preindustrial era, and the increased fertility made possible by more food led women to have more babies and spend a greater proportion of their lives pregnant. In many subsistence societies, women breast-feed for four to five years, during which time ovulation may be suppressed, and there are fewer pregnancies.

102. Identify the difference between an interdependent and an independent view of self. In a cultural tradition with an interdependent view of self, a diffuse boundary exists between self-identity and people within one's closest group and family, there is a sharp boundary between in-group and out-group with less easy inclusion of others into one's in-group, and one views the self as needing to change to accommodate different relationships, with an emphasis on these relationships. An interdependent view of self is more common in non-Western cultures and traditional, nonindustrialized societies. It is not unusual in these cultures for decisions like marriage and occupation to be made traditionally by family members rather than self.

In contrast, in a family tradition with an independent view of self, clear boundaries exist between self-identity and others, there is a diffuse boundary between in-group and out-group with easier inclusion of others into one's in-group, and one views self as an unchanging entity over time, with an emphasis on individualism. Such cultures are traditionally Western. People from families with these cultural backgrounds typically make choices for themselves, such as whom to marry or what to study in university.

103. Explain the common and widespread influences of agriculture and modernization on gender roles and sexuality.

In most societies that practiced agriculture, a strict division of power emerged with a small percentage of individuals coming to control the political and economic structures within society—mostly males. Mostly all forage-and-return hunter gatherer societies developed

patriarchal structures after adopting agriculture. Reasons for this include the division of labor, with the 15 to 20 percent greater upper body strength favoring males for production of food in a preindustrial era, and the increased fertility made possible by more food led women to have more babies and spend a greater proportion of their lives pregnant.

Other powerful and shared influences on gender and sexuality are industrialization, urban living, and a shared cultural experience. Whether in Tokyo or Toronto, Sao Paolo or Shanghai, Boston or Bangalore, people have access to electricity, the internet, and mobile phones, and they often listen to the same music and buy the same clothes. The Western countries that industrialized earliest have particularly widespread influences in global culture. Technology itself exerts a powerful influence on gender and sexuality. For example, reliable oral contraceptives were first discovered in the late 1950s. They give women control over fertility, and today, in all countries where women become more educated and income levels increase sufficiently for access to contraceptives to become possible, a majority of women chose to have far smaller families.

104. Consider the roles of mass media and the internet in relation to their influence on sexuality.

Media and artistic products both reflect the values and attitudes of a culture and serve to shape those attitudes. For example, portrayals of positive gay male characters in U.S. television were nonexistent in the 1970s and are relatively common today in domestic U.S. television, both reflecting changes in cultural attitudes and also serving to affect attitudes, particularly among adolescents. However, in part because many countries are more restrictive of material that has nudity or sexual content than material that has violence and because companies market where demand exists, cultural exports that are marketed globally tend not to be as varied in their portrayals of sexuality as material that is produced for domestic markets in the United States.

The internet has been described as a great leveler of information. Although many countries, including the Islamic Middle Eastern nations and China, have strict limits on freedom of expression of political ideas and sexual content online, technology makes it possible for many computer users to bypass these restrictions. The speed of technological innovation is often far faster than that of research or public policy, and technological innovations often quickly become incorporated into sexual relationships and behavior, such as sexting and smartphone GPS-enabled dating apps. The internet can also serve to reinforce in-group and traditional cultural values, providing communities in which people with like-minded views can gather and supporting the spread of misinformation.

Another influence of modern media is on body image. For example, people have a desire to see attractive images, so of course people who are more attractive are more likely to be cast in television programs or to go viral on YouTube.

There is a biological basis to many aspects of what is considered attractive as well as to some cross-cultural universals. In a world of billions, it's easy to find the top 1 or 2 percent who are substantially more attractive than an average person. However, being bombarded with images of people in the top 1 or 2 percent of attractiveness, especially if these images are further enhanced and digitally manipulated, has been shown to contribute to some people feeling

substandard, leading to a greater desire to modify the body, sometimes in ways that are unhealthy, such as eating disorders or steroid abuse. Because body image relates to a perceived dissatisfaction or inadequacy, and even though there is no functional impairment, the effect on a person's sexuality may be as real as if there were a functional impairment. This also leads to surgeries, such as penile and breast enhancements, which are increasingly common in industrialized countries. There are wide variations between industrialized countries in the popularity of such surgeries, showing that even in an era of global media, many local variations exist.

105. Specify examples of gender, sexuality, and family structure differences in indigenous cultures.

Indigenous cultures historically show enormous variation in both gender roles and sexuality. Traditional pre-agricultural-society social structures have fewer power differences between individuals or between males and females. The Musuo people in China have a matriarchal structure, with property passing along female lines. The Yanomamo of the Amazon have males trained to be fierce warriors yet also have a concept known as partible paternity, in which all males are viewed as fathering the village's children. On Jeju Island in South Korea, traditional male-dominated gender roles are inverted, and women historically went out seeking food by deep-sea diving, while men stayed at home. A great many indigenous cultures have traditions for recognizing a "third sex" or "third gender," which combines aspects of variance in gender identity, gender role conformity, or sexual orientation. In some cultures, such as in Mangaia, a South Pacific island, sexual activity begins in adolescence, with no guilt or shame and with a strong emphasis on sexual pleasure of both sexes. Some cultures, such as the Aka hunters in central Africa, appear to have never heard of masturbation to orgasm, and sex is not viewed as a pleasure, but males view it as a job necessary to bring forth children, and same-sex attractions are rarely reported. In others, such as native Māori society in New Zealand, those with same-sex attraction may traditionally have been accorded status in their communities, but after English colonization and the adoption of Christianity, these attractions became viewed as inferior. Broadly speaking, indigenous cultures show how flexible human nature can be with regard to what is considered gender-typical behavior, normal sexual activity, and a proper family structure.

106. Discuss Richard von Krafft-Ebing's findings on sexuality and why his book is considered important.

In 1886, Richard von Krafft-Ebing wrote and published what became one of the first best-selling medical texts on sexuality, calling it *Psychopathia Sexualis*. He documented a wide range of sexual practices and described them as both perversions and medical problems, thus pathologizing as medical and mental illness things that today are known to be a normative part of sexual behavior. He included masturbation, same-sex attraction, and numerous examples of focused sexual interest in objects, clothing, or activities, which today we call kinks and fetishes. The book was soon translated into English and affected laws in England,

the United States, and parts of the world occupied by colonial European governments. He kept the style of using Latin for the sexual acts so that only physicians would understand. Krafft-Ebing's book is important because it marks the first time that psychiatry claimed sexuality and sexual behavior as medical matters—something that continues today. It also shows that many of the debates about sexuality in the United States and other countries in the twenty-first century were just as contentious as they were in the 1800s. Lastly, it shows how attitudes have changed in many topics.

107. Elaborate on the different factors that contributed to the sexual revolution of the 1960s. Effective oral contraceptives became widely available and sexual attitudes underwent a dramatic generational shift during the 1960s, in part as a result of the reduced risk of pregnancy and in part due to the shift in attitudes brought about by Alfred Kinsey's research. Other factors resulting in the sexual revolution of the 1960s was the emergence of a popular youth culture that encouraged a rejection of traditional values, participated in an antiwar protest movement challenging the Vietnam War, and rejected traditional authority.

108. Distinguish between sex-positive and sex-negative value systems. Cultures that historically view sexual pleasure as a positive part of human experience, to be enjoyed for its own sake, are referred to as being sex positive. Sex negative refers to cultures and attitudes that view sexual pleasure as only being appropriate if expressed in certain contexts or for certain purposes and that view sexual activity outside of these contexts as being inferior or wrong.

109. Briefly discuss the steps of the modern scientific method. The scientific method is a process of learning about reality based on objective, verifiable evidence that permits ideas to be tested. The specific steps vary depending on the area of science. In the physical sciences, the approach involves gathering observations about natural phenomena in an objective manner, building theories to explain these, and making specific predictions from theory known as hypotheses. Next, one sets out to test one's hypotheses in a manner that clearly supports or rejects each hypothesis. If a hypothesis is supported, the theory is strengthened, particularly if supported by multiple experiments by different researchers. If a hypothesis is rejected or the results are counter to those expected, it suggests that the theory is incomplete or false. This leads to revising or even discarding theories on the basis of evidence.
