Describe Karl Marx's views on conflict and capitalism. According to Marx, what is alienation?

Suggested answer: Sample response: According to Marx, conflict emerged from the economic substructure of capitalism. He argued that there was a conflict between the two classes of workers: the bourgeoisie, those who owned the means of production; and the proletariat, the workers. Marx maintained that in a capitalist society, individuals were alienated from one's true self, and alienation occurred on multiple levels. For example, a person could be alienated from their work, the product of their work, other workers, and their own human potential.

Describe the role of feminist perspectives in examining social problems, including oppression and inequality.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Feminist theories focus on the causes and consequences of women's oppression. The feminist perspective examines gender and other forms of oppression as the source of inequality and social problems. For example, feminist theorists may examine reasons why women often earn less money even when they hold the same or similar positions to men in the workforce. They also may be interested in the unequal division of household labor and childcare responsibilities between men and women.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Survey research is a data collection based on responses to a series of questions. Surveys can be offered in several formats: a self-administered mailed survey, group surveys, in-person interviews, or telephone surveys. Qualitative methods include data collection conducted in the field, emphasizing the observations about natural behavior as experienced or witnessed by the researcher. Methods include participant observation for gathering data, which involves developing, and sustaining relationships with people while they go about their normal activities. Focus groups are unstructured group interviews where a focus group leader actively encourages discussion among participants on the topic of interest. Lastly, relatively unstructured, is intensive interviewing, where the interviewer seeks in-depth information on the interviewee's feelings and experiences, and perceptions. A third of the methods are historical and comparative methods is the historical method is a research method that focuses on one historical period or traces a series of events over time. Comparative research involves multiple cases or more than one time period. The fourth and final of the methods is secondary data analysis, which usually involves analysis of previously collected data that are used in a new analysis. Large public survey data sets such as the U.S. Census the General Social Survey, the National Election Survey, or the International Social Survey Program can be used, as can data collected in experimental studies or with qualitative data sets.

Suggested answer: Sample response: The functionalist perspective is a macro-level theory that examines the functions of the structure of society. It focuses on how society creates and maintains social order. Functionalists often consider those social problems may serve a function in society. For example, poverty has negative consequences (or dysfunctions) for children and families. However, a functionalist would consider that poverty benefits society in some ways, such as there are many jobs that depend on the existence of poverty. Without poverty, there would not be a need for many social agencies, non-profit organizations, and workers. While conflict perspective suggests that society is held together by power and coercion, they argue that social problems tend to benefit those in power. For example, the rich may profit from individuals who are suffering in poverty. The rich also tend to support policies that benefit themselves at the expense of those with fewer resources.

Describe how social policy can lead to social change. Using specific examples, describe the role of social advocates and social innovation in facilitating social change.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Social policy refers to the enactment of a course of action through formal law or program. Policies reflect and shape the way society views social problems and the people who may experience these problems. For example, single parents may have difficulties affording childcare for their children, so they are able to work outside of the home. In response to this social problem, the U.S. government has developed financial assistance programs that can help parents pay for childcare including childcare subsidies (or vouchers). Head Start and Early Head Start are other programs that have been designed to help families who have low incomes prepare their children for school. Social advocates use their resources to support, educate, and empower individuals and their communities. Using the same example, a social advocate could help educate a low-income family on various resources that are available to help them. Social innovation may take the form of a policy, a program, or advocacy that features an untested or unique approach. There have been many innovative approaches used to assist low-income families. For example, Habitat for Humanity, a nonprofit organization that has helped build more than 1 million houses worldwide for individuals in need of housing.

Drawing from the symbolic interactionist perspective, what is the self? Give an example of how the self emerges from social interaction.

Suggested answer: Sample response: According to George Herbert Mead, the self is a mental and social process, and it is the reflective ability to see others in relation to ourselves and to see ourselves in relation to others. Symbolic interactionism focuses on micro-level social interactions. It is concerned with how we interact and communicate with others through words and symbols. The self emerges from interactions. We use our past experiences to help guide our social interactions. For example, in a classroom setting, the interactions between a professor and students help establish their roles within the educational system. When a student raises their hand and waits for the professor to call on them, it reinforces the established social roles and the power dynamics within that context.

Explain the four-stage process identified by Spector and Kituse in the identification of a social problem.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Stage 1 "transformation process": private trouble is transformed into a public issue. In this stage, an influential group, activists, or advocates call attention to and define an issue as a social problem. Stage 2 "legitimization process": The way social problems are handled is formalized. Stage 3 "conflict stage," when Stage 2 routines are unable to address the problem. During Stage 3, activists, advocates, and victims of the problem experience feelings of distrust and cynicism toward the formal response organizations. Stage 3 activities include readjusting the formal response system: renegotiating procedures, reforming practices, and engaging in administrative or organizational restructuring. Stage 4 begins when groups believe that they can no longer work within the established system. Advocates or activists are faced with two options: to radically change the existing system or to work outside the system.

Suggested answer: Sample response: Sociology is a science because it uses systematic and logical methods to study social phenomena, similar to how biology studies the natural world. Sociologists develop theories, conduct empirical research using observations and data, and test hypotheses to understand patterns and relationships within society. Like other sciences, sociology relies on evidence gathered through quantitative and qualitative research methods to build knowledge about how our social world operates.
