Instead of examining large-scale structural factors, the social psychologist would investigate the individual experiences, attitudes, and behaviors that perpetuate or challenge educational disparities. They might explore how stereotypes, implicit biases, or self-perceptions affect academic performance, motivation, and educational aspirations. By shifting the focus to the individual level, the social psychologist can delve into the cognitive, affective, and behavioral processes that underlie educational inequality. By understanding the psychological mechanisms at play, social psychologists can provide insights into interventions and strategies that can mitigate educational disparities and promote equitable outcomes.

Social psychological research, such as the work conducted by Gregory Walton and his colleagues, has shed light on the detrimental impact of these concerns on academic performance and has explored the effectiveness of interventions aimed at improving social belonging. One noteworthy study conducted by Walton and his team focused on enhancing the academic success of women in a prestigious engineering school via a belongingness intervention, where the majority of students in their majors were men. Women in such fields often report feeling unwelcome and disrespected, which can hinder their performance. In this study, the researchers implemented an experiment involving a brief intervention aimed at countering these concerns. Surprisingly, with this brief intervention, the women achieved GPAs comparable to those of the men, effectively eliminating the gender gap. This study exemplifies the influential role of the perceived social context in real-world outcomes and highlights the power of interventions that address social belonging concerns. Furthermore, similar positive results have been observed for underrepresented Black students in predominantly White institutions through social-belonging interventions. Walton and his colleagues conducted a study where Black students received interventions aimed at enhancing their feelings of social belonging during their first year of college. The interventions had a profound impact on the students' academic performance throughout their college years. Notably, in a follow-up study conducted about a decade later, the Black participants who had received the intervention reported greater career satisfaction and overall well-being compared to those who had not received the intervention. These long-term positive effects demonstrated the enduring benefits of the social-belonging intervention, which continued to shape the participants' lives even years after its implementation.
